From the Rev Dr Simon Taylor

AN interesting little illustration of modern life this week. I was chatting with someone who needed a way for customers to pay for her art at an exhibition. We use a SumUp card reader for receiving payments in church. You see them all over the place now. Neat little thing that links to an app on your mobile, and you can take payments, donations etc., for a fee of about 1% of the payment. Very convenient and works well, so I recommended it to her and sent her a link on WhatsApp.



Fast forward a couple of days and she is getting adverts on her Instagram feed for SumUp card readers. WhatsApp are clearly harvesting information from messages, analysing key words, and flogging the data to advertisers.

It seems to happen when you just talk about things too. A possible new car purchase was one example in our house. Adverts for that type of new car start popping up in our social media feeds. This could be coincidence, but at times it does seem that what you say can be harvested for advertising purposes. Do WhatsApp and similar listen in?

I don't care about this very much, though maybe I should. Most of the online and phone services I use are more or less free, or certainly low cost, and one knowledgeable techy person said that if something seems to be free then you yourself are the product. The analogy does not quite work, but what they meant was that if you use a free online service the provider has to make money out of you somehow, and that is usually through selling information for use by advertisers. I like the 'free' services, but it is still a shock when you see direct results of the information harvest.

If we use these apps we just have to accept that an awful lot is known about us. Do you have a street WhatsApp group? Very useful for keeping in touch with the neighbours, and of course you don't mind them knowing the things you post. But for an advertiser these groups, collated and analysed, are a little gold mine - who has pets, an alarm system, buys fresh fish, is interested in local planning issues, is looking for accommodation to put up guests for a family wedding and so on. All marketable information, and, we should assume, all probably up for sale. In our digital world we are known by others through all sorts of clever coding, probably more so than we guess; sometimes it is comfortable and useful, and at other times a bit disturbing.

Being known – comfortably or uncomfortably – is something Christians are used to thinking about. Psalm 139 starts

'You have searched me, Lord

and you know me.'

This is not a WhatsApp data scrape, but something rather more fundamental.

'You know when I sit and when I rise;

you perceive my thoughts from afar.

You discern my going and my lying down;

you are familiar with all my ways.

Before a word is on my tongue

you, Lord, know it completely.'

It is wonderful stuff and well worth a read. Try the biblegateway.com website or ask me for a bible.

It is not just about being known though. It is about the enduring presence of God. The psalmist asks "Where can I flee from your Spirit?" And the answer is, you can't, for he is everywhere.

I wonder what you think of this? Creepy supernatural WhatsApp harvesting? Or something rather comforting? The comforting point is that in all tribulations, in every circumstance, whatever we have done, God is there for us. God, the psalmist says, is both the source of his life and its continuing support. He

'lays his hand upon me ...

your hand will guide me,

your right hand will hold me fast ...

even the darkness will not be dark to you;

the night will shine like the day

for darkness is as light to you.

For you created my inmost being;

you knit me together in my mother's womb.'

Being truly known by someone who loves us is a gift. If someone 'gets' who you are, understands your character, your way of life, your uncertainties, your flaws, your joys and sufferings, and if they love you because of or despite all these things, then your relationship with them can flourish. It can be the greatest source of comfort.

That is one of the reasons why Christmas is so important to Christians. The moment when God put into action his plan to live as a human being, as Jesus, the son of Mary – not just to observe humans and know humanity that way, but to actually be one of us in every way – is maybe the most important moment in human history, vying for that title with only the

crucifixion, resurrection and bodily ascension of Christ. Now we can be sure not only that we are known by God as the psalmist understood it, but that God has walked in our shoes. God the code writer not only knows his code, he has been and still is – remind me to write about the bodily ascension of Christ one of these days – one of us. That changes everything.

A very happy, if rather premature, Christmas to you all, Simon

Mothers' Union

Report on the Autumn Diocesan Council



THE second very well attended Mothers' Union Diocesan Council of the year was held in Waterbeach in late October, where the speaker

was Julia Jamieson, a Zonal Trustee on the Global MU Board – she represents the Province of Canterbury. There are 14 Board members on a three-year rotation from all parts of the world where the Mothers' Union has a presence. The MU global work encompasses literacy, establishing savings groups, working to prevent gender-based violence and parenting groups.

Julia described several instances of where the Mothers' Union is having an impact. For example, in the Windward Islands, they provide lunch for schoolchildren who may otherwise not have much to eat. In Burundi, the literacy and finance programme has had much success (it has been running for 20 years), with 165,000 participants (77% of whom are women), helping 144,000 to become literate. In addition, 7,500 people attended the parenting groups in Burundi. These programmes help women, in particular, to set up micro businesses and thus contribute to the country's economic development.

Julia also spoke about the big plans for the 150th anniversary year of the Mothers' Union foundation by Mary Sumner. In the UK, there will be a

service in St Paul's Cathedral in June (and look out for our local efforts to celebrate this big anniversary). We have a new Patron, Sophie, Duchess of Edinburgh, continuing the royal patronage tradition, dating back to the foundation of the Mothers' Union in 1876.

Mary Sumner House, our headquarters, has rationalized its staff, thus saving money to put towards further programmes (the UK and Ireland contribute the most financial support for the MU action programmes). The emphasis of the Global Board is on returning to the grass roots ethos of the Mothers' Union with the following aims:



Stapleford Strollers Walk 142

To Hadstock and Back: another walk at Linton

To get to start of walk

DRIVE along the A1307 to Linton. Turn left into the High Street. The Crown is a short distance on the left and has a small car park through an archway. There is also limited parking in the High Street.

Length of Walk

About 4.75 miles. It will take about two and a quarter hours and is reasonably flat, with a few gentle inclines.

Extra Information

The first written reference to Linton is reported to have been in AD 725. The name originally meant 'flax farm' or 'flax enclosure'. It was a flourishing market town in the Middle Ages, but the market finally closed in 1864; however, Market Lane is still a turning off the High Street. The Crown dates to at least 1600 and was originally a coaching inn.

OS Map

Explorer map 209. Use your smart phone, or to get free map extracts use footpathmaps.com. The route map provided is easy-to-use, too.

Route of the Walk

Turn right outside the pub and, at the top of the High Street, go over the A1307 at the pedestrian crossing. Turn right and after about 100 metres, turn left onto a footpath signposted to Great Chesterford.

This path initially runs to the right of a high fence and through some trees. After crossing a stile, keep going in the same direction across a field to an identical stile on the far side. Soon after crossing the second stile, the path emerges into open farmland. Follow the path straight ahead between two large fields on a gentle rise. At the far end, go through a gap in the hedge and turn left. After 100 metres, turn left again through another gap in the hedge. Go straight ahead until a cross path is joined.

Turn left and then immediately right to cross a footbridge. Follow this path until it passes some workshops on the right on the outskirts of Hadstock. Just before the road is reached, follow a path ahead separated from the road by wooden railings. Walk the length of the village street. At the end, where the main road turns right, cross over carefully onto the village green. Go up the minor road with the green on your right. Immediately after Moules Lane joins on the left, turn right by a footpath sign (partially concealed), with a house called 'Plovers' on your left. Bear slightly


left and join a broad footpath. After about 250 metres a footpath goes off to the left. Ignore this and take a second footpath on the left after another 200 metres at a post marked '18'.

Follow the field boundary with the hedge on your left as you gently descend. Look out for where the path leaves the field and goes into the trees on the left, about half way to the bottom of the field. This becomes a broad path through trees. Just before you reach a road, turn right over a footbridge. Bear right and follow the path between fields. Soon after reaching a small wood on the right, the path turns left and then comes out on a farm track. Turn left and continue until you reach a road.

Follow the road for about 500 metres until you reach a corner where the road turns left. At this corner turn right onto a green lane. At the far end of the green lane a view of Linton opens up. Bear left following the field boundary and keeping the hedge on your left.

You will soon see an old windmill converted into a house. Keep following the field boundary to the far end of the field and continue on the path between hedges. After a short distance the path turns right and then left as it crosses an old brick railway bridge. After the bridge bear left onto a lane, passing a row of cottages ('Malting Cottages') on the right. Keep going straight ahead, ignoring a lane off to the right. You pass a couple of attractive cottages on your left and come out onto a main road. Cross carefully and walk along The Grip, which brings you back to the top end of Linton High Street. **John Coppendale**

Roots and Resilience - Charles and Colin Bradford



ON 14 October we were treated to a charming and informative father and son double act by Colin (81) and Charles (53) Bradford, currently famous for their splendid farm shop known as The Gog. Their aim was to talk about the family connection to Heath Farm and to explain how local farming has had to change in order to survive.

The Bradfords arrived at the farm in 1919 as proud tenants of Gonville and Caius, one of the many Cambridge University Colleges who own many, many acres of land. Colin's father was one of nine sons and they all lived in the area. Colin was born at Heath Farm, which was much larger than now, with the current Golf Club being based on what was their 99 acre field.

In the years between the two world wars there were several small farms in Stapleford managed by Frank Hardy, Bob Arley, Norman Challis, the Beavis brothers and Pat Lincoln, to name but a few. Farming was mixed with horses doing a lot of the work before the post war advent of machinery. Fields were smaller and many people had pigs and chickens in their gardens. Even The Rose had a smallholding at the back of the pub.



During WW2 there was a great need to produce as much of our own food as possible. There were financial incentives to enlarge the fields, use some chemicals, and even bring in foreign prisoners of war to work on a daily basis, with the Italians and Germans returning to their camp in the evening. Stricter controls came in later.

After Colin's father died, the Bradfords started to diversify by bringing calves from Wales, keeping them indoors, fattening them up on milk substitute initially then feeding them on barley. Eventually they were taken to Saffron Walden Cattle Market and sold as 'barley beef'. This was very successful but joining the EU brought in changes to livestock production, so they began to raise turkeys, which led to the development of the farm shop.

Between 1980 and 2000 many small farms became subsumed into larger concerns, as people retired or moved on. The Bradford family is quite rare in still being actively involved in farming lasting more than a century.



Christmas – as you plan for the festive season, try and think about the environment whilst you are surrounded by overpackaged gifts and plastic stuff. Lots of gift wrapping is recyclable (beware of metallic products), and try and find items that have less packaging. Use local shops or craft fairs to buy food and gifts, and if you are buying a Christmas tree, one with roots in

a pot that you can put out in the garden each January is the most environmentally friendly one, though it won't grow very tall and doesn't like being too long in a warm room. We have an artificial one, but as it is 15 years old or so it's not a bad environmental decision to have made – better than a real cut one each year.



Neighbourhood Plan – now that the Plan for Great Shelford and Stapleford has been passed, we and our Parish Councils need to ensure that the planning authority takes it on board when looking at planning applications e.g. size of houses, exterior lighting to minimise the effect on wildlife, surface drainage not going into the drains and rivers, energy saving

measures in new houses. The Plan can be found on scambs.gov.uk, click through Planning to Neighbourhood Planning, and Appendix 2 gives a useful checklist of things to look at when examining a proposed planning application.

Greater Cambridge Local Plan - Cambridge City Council and SCDC have released a draft of the new local plan for 'Greater Cambridge' for the next 20 years. This includes, in our part of South Cambs, a new settlement of 6,000 houses near Little Abington, expansion of the Cambridge Biomedical Campus into the Cambridge Green Belt and plans for large logistics warehouses adjacent to the A14 and A11. There is obviously a risk that these further conversions of countryside and farmland into built environment will increase pressure on water resources and cause a loss of habitat for wildlife. More information can be found at Greater Cambridge Shared Planning. A public consultation on the draft plan is due to begin on 1 December and will run until 30 January next year.

Yesteryear

THIS article was received before the sad news of Sylvia's untimely passing. We think that it is fitting that it remains included.

Sylvia Morris looks at events in the month of December over the years. Punctuation, spelling and capital letters are exactly as printed at the time.

1831

SALE. The justly noted and admired flock of Leicester sheep on Bury Farm, Stapleford, which was sold last week brought high prices. The ewes fetched 40s. to 45s. and the lambs from 32s. to 33s. 6d.

1888

CHOIR DINNER. On Friday evening the Church Choir was entertained at dinner in the National School Room, and a pleasant evening was afterwards spent, dancing being engaged in. Too much praise cannot be accorded to Miss Finch, Miss Shreeve and Mr. Finch for the time and trouble they devoted to the organisation of the entertainment; and the liberality of the friends was such that much of the provisions was not consumed during the evening, the remainder was, on the following morning, thoughtfully distributed among the widows and poor of the parish.

1920

BELL RINGING. A number of ladies formed a troop of bell ringers and went from door to door ringing and playing carols. They collected £18 for St Dunstan's.

1922

VICTORY DINNER. The great "Victory Dinner" organised by the Cambs Conservative and Unionist Association to commemorate Mr Harold Gray's success in the General Election took place at the Lion Hotel on Saturday evening and was a very happy function. The large room was filled with a mixed gathering, whilst there was a substantial overflow into the ante-room, the number present being only a few short of 300. Major C Wentworth Stanley presided, being supported by Mr Harold Gray (the county member), Mrs Gray, Sir Douglas Newton (the borough member), Major General Sir Layton Blenkinsop and many other distinguished guests.

1937

TENNIS CLUB. A whist drive held in the Institute on Tuesday was a great success. It was for funds for the tennis club. After all expenses were paid a profit of £4 7s 0d was realised.

1943

REPATRIATED. We are glad to welcome home, among the list of repatriated POWs Mr Fred Farnham of Stapleford.

1973

STAPLEFORD VILLAGERS HIT AT "HIDEOUS" SCHOOL. The £70,000 school in Bar Lane will accommodate some 50 handicapped children when it is finished in January. Parish council chairman and head of Stapleford Primary School, Mr Harold Holt, said the controversy over the building began 18 months ago when the first brick was laid. Since then the parish council have constantly complained to the county education department but without success. Mr Holt's comment on the building was that it looked angry. A spokesman for the county architect's department, Mr Kenneth Bass, said the parish council were told about the school plans and building materials to be used. "It is designed to fit in with the local environment, which includes a red-roofed barn nearby" he said.

The school opened for pupils on 22nd January 1974 with David Eden as headmaster and a staff of eight. Three years later when Dawn Robinson took over there were 34 children on the school roll and the school had its own swimming pool. She felt that the school was consistently understaffed and underfunded but widened the children's activities considerably with the help of the friends' group and parents. It gradually became an educational establishment rather than an institute of care. Changes in educational policy led to the eventual closure of the school in January 2006.

Top tips for safe and happy pets this Christmas

FOR most of us, Christmas is an exciting time, but while some of our pets might enjoy the fun, timid, ill or elderly pets may struggle. Even those that enjoy the festivities can get themselves into trouble with Christmas treats. So, what can you do to keep your pets as happy and safe as possible?

If you have a pet who is likely to rip open presents, it's a good idea *not* to store them under the Christmas tree! And even if your pet is an angel, it's worth checking if presents are edible. Avoid hanging chocolate baubles or similar on the tree, and if your dog or cat is prone to climbing and destruction, consider putting the tree in a less accessible area of the house.

There is an ever-growing list of foods that are harmful to pets. Of note around Christmas time are holly and mistletoe berries, dried fruits (think Christmas pudding, Christmas cake and mince pies) grapes, onions, leeks and garlic, chocolate, alcohol, macadamia nuts and the sweetener, xylitol. Whilst not limited to Christmas time, antifreeze is highly toxic to cats, so any spills should be cleaned up immediately. Cooked bones are problematic for dogs as they can easily splinter and cause injuries and blockages, and raw bones can damage teeth and contain harmful bacteria. There are plenty of safe and tasty treats available if you want to spoil your pet, or a small serving of plain cooked meat will suit most pets.

If you are worried about something your pet has eaten, call your veterinary practice straight away. If your practice is closed, you can call Animal PoisonLine on 01202 509000. (There is a charge for this service, see animalpoisonline.co.uk for more information.)

Vets Now also have a very helpful chocolate toxicity calculator that you can access free of charge online at dog-chocolate-calculator.vets-now.com.

It's also worth bearing in mind that the extra noise and visitors, and disruption to routine can be quite stressful for pets, so try and make sure they get their usual walks, plenty of chance to sleep, and have a quiet, safe place to which they can retreat if it all gets a bit much. And as fun as it might be to dress your pet up as Santa's little helper, remember that this might not be their idea of fun!

Neighbourhood Plan update

Implementing our plan and a website refresh



THE adopted Stapleford & Gt Shelford Neighbourhood Plan now has a life of its own. It is routinely used by our parish councillors, and by local authority planners, when reviewing

planning applications coming forward in our area.

Implementing the NP

For those who don't know, parish councillors are statutory consultees in the planning process. They are notified of and can comment on planning applications in their area, although they do not have the power to approve or reject them. However, their local knowledge adds value to the process and the planning authority must take their comments into account. Since NP policies carry the same weight as a Local Plan and the National Planning Policy Framework in planning decisions, our NP is a highly significant addition to the local knowledge bank.

But the NP is far more than a yard stick against which planning applications are assessed. It has an active role to play in shaping new development long before the planning application stage is reached. Residents who are following Nightingale Land's and The Hill Group's emerging plans for 120 new homes on farmland behind Hinton Way/Mingle Lane may recognise this. The developers' proposed affordable housing numbers, property sizes, on-site biodiversity, drainage plan, play spaces, etc, reflect policies in our NP.

From my perspective, our NP may now be adopted but that doesn't mean that I can cross it off my 'to do' list. At the time of writing, I'm preparing a training presentation to give in person to Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Services' development management officers to support their implementation of our NP policies in planning decisions.

Draft Greater Cambridge Local Plan

The latest draft Greater Cambridge Local Plan has just been released (27 Oct). You can find the myriad of documents associated with it at: consultations.greatercambridgeplanning.org/draft-greater-cambridge-local-plan-scrutiny-committee-pack/greater-cambridge-local-plan-scrutiny, apologies for the mega-URL.

I'm keeping an eye on it for two reasons: first, for its implications for our parishes; and, second, because when it is eventually adopted, the NP will have to be compatible with it and hence may need some updates.

The draft Local Plan outlines potential locations for new homes and workplaces over the next 20 years, and the community facilities and public services needed to prop up this growth. It highlights the need for more than 50,000 new homes from 2024 to 2045 to support the projected rise in employment. Of these, around 37,000 homes are already covered by existing planning permissions and sites designated in local plans adopted in 2018.

One prospective site which has been *removed* from the latest draft is that on greenbelt arable land behind Hinton Way/Mingle Lane, on the basis that this land does not need to be released from the greenbelt for the draft Local Plan to hit its housing target. However, the developers are still proceeding with preparations to submit an outline planning application for this location and held a public exhibition of their plans at Stapleford Pavilion on 15 Nov.

A new-look NP webpage

Finally, residents who want to know more about the NP – whether for general interest or specific planning purposes – can now benefit from an updated NP webpage. We have replaced the webpages we used while developing the plan with a new, one-stop-shop URL for information and links. Do please have a look at greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk/sgsnplan. For anyone who prefers to flick rather than click through pages, a soft copy of the full NP is now held at Great Shelford Library.





Parish Council Chair's report

AT the November meeting Duncan Kerr was appointed as a new Parish Councillor. Cllr Michael Gatward has resigned, and thanks were given to him for all his work for the Parish and Parish Council. A notice of vacancy will be posted for the remaining vacancy on the Parish Council.

District Cllr Will Jackson-Wood attended the meeting and reported that the Local Government Reorganisation will be discussed by the District Council on 24 November. SCDC is likely to be asked to support option B (splitting Cambridgeshire into two unitary authorities: North comprising Fenland, East Cambridgeshire and Huntingdon, and South comprising South Cambridgeshire and Cambridge. This option is considered to be the most financially and strategically viable). Local elections will be held in May 2026.

Now that the Neighbourhood Plan has been adopted, councillors were able to use this when considering the planning applications. Planning applications submitted now must comply with the Neighbourhood Plan.

A regional representative from Age UK attended the meeting to give a short presentation in support of a Parish Council grant for 2026-2027. This grant and other financial matters, such as the installation of further adult gym equipment on the recreation ground, will be discussed at the budget planning meeting.

The Parish Council discussed obtaining a debit card (to make the audit trail and VAT claims easier) and the clerk will produce a policy document for its use. This will be considered at the next meeting.

Agreement was given for the installation of a noticeboard for the David Pepperell community orchard.

Floodlights will be installed in the Pavilion car park to increase safety and ease of access. Tree work in the cemetery was agreed. A grant was approved for CamSwift (a locally based conservation group installing nest boxes on local houses).

The next meeting is on Thursday 4 December at 7pm in the Pavilion. Residents are invited to attend. **Gillian Pett**


